All West Virginia teachers are responsible for classroom instruction that integrates content standards, technology, and dispositions for student success. In grade 5, students should be immersed in a literacy-rich environment and have numerous opportunities to read, discuss, and write to complex texts appropriate for fifth grade in order to meet college- and career-readiness expectations. The complexity of a text includes quantitative complexity (such as Lexile), qualitative complexity (such as conceptual knowledge, text structure, and figurative language), and reader and task considerations (such as student interest/motivation and instructional goal for reading). Over the course of the entire instructional day, students should be given opportunities to engage with a balance of literary and informational text and to write for a variety of purposes and audiences including an even distribution of opinion, informative, and narrative writing. Students in fifth grade will continue enhancing skills in a developmentally-appropriate progression of standards.
