

WV Budget and Financial Outlook

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We've Been Through a Lot

- WV has seen employment decline for much of the last five years.
- Most job losses are due to the downturn in the coal industry and weakness in natural gas.
- Dependency on export markets.
- Natural gas transmission issues.
- Population down >40,000 people since 2012. Enrollment over the past 25 years down >49,000; 16%.
- 14 budget cuts from fy10 through fy20.
- FY16 and FY17 included mid-year state aid cuts >\$11m each.

Pension Funding

- TRS Funded Percentages 31.6% on 7/1/06; 71.1% on 7/1/19.
- 34,108 Actives, 36,652 Retirees.
- PERS 93.9% on 7/1/19
- TRS Unfunded Liability Payments have averaged approx. \$337 million over the past ten years.
- This will payout in June 2034 (26 years down, 14 years to go)
- Total payments for FY2021 \$33 million TRS Savings Realized \$66.5 million Normal Costs \$304.7 million Unfunded Liability \$404 million Total

- Total \$626 million

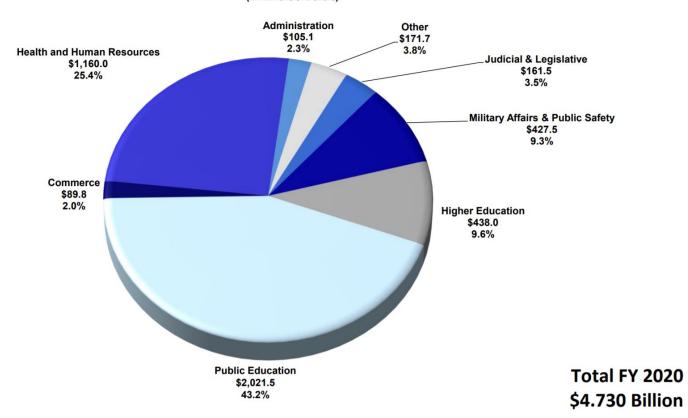

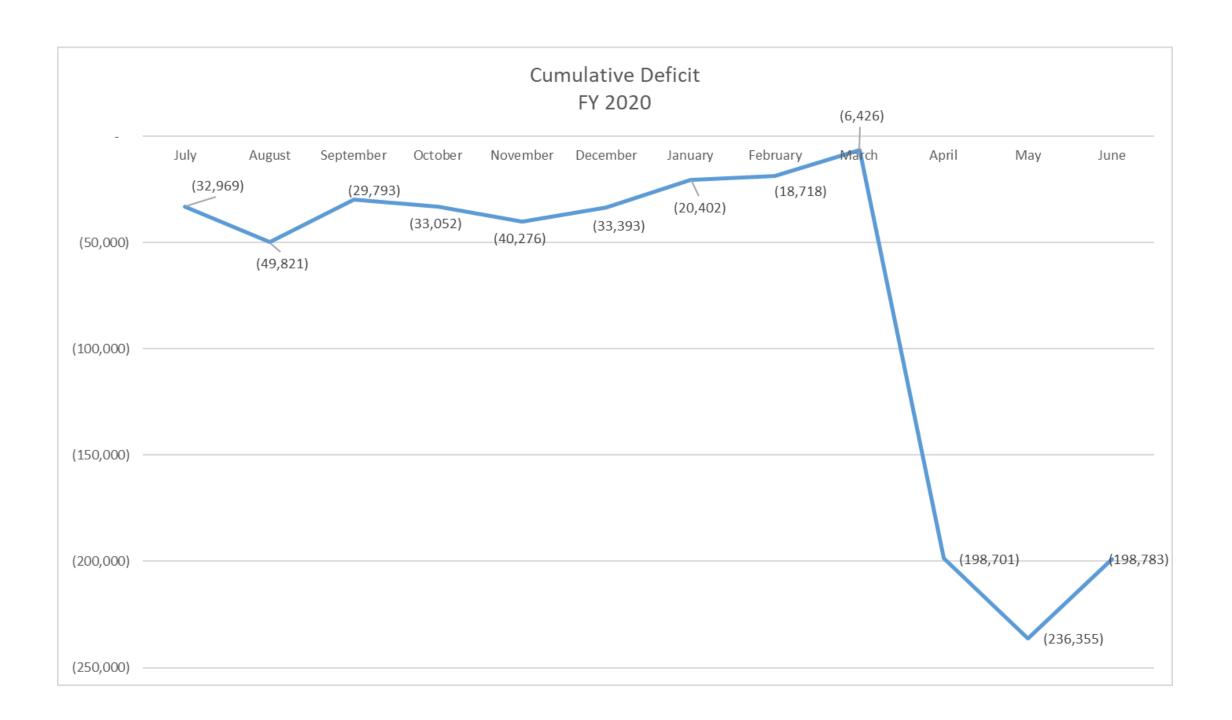

Earlier Discussion of Possible Mid-Year Cuts...

FY20 discussions in mid-November of a possible mid-year cut at 4.6% or \$100 million (the cumulative deficit 1/3 of the way into the year was -\$33 million).

No reduction occurred as December – February revenues improved.

Rockefeller Decision...

STATE EX REL. BD of ED., ETC. v. HON. JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER, IV, GOVERNOR; 1981

The Supreme Court of Appeals held that: state constitutional provisions give a constitutional preferred status to public education....

COVID-19 Effect

- April 13 possible \$500 million deficit was projected.
- Potential remedies included use of the Rainy Day Fund (currently \$855 million balance).
- Year-End agency reductions.



COVID-19 Effect

- Executive Order 48-20 issued on June 30, 2020 ordered the reductions of \$186m DHHR; \$9m MAPS; \$1m Commerce and \$2m Education.
- Education's reductions were \$1.7m in expiring Increased Enrollment, \$150,000 Early Retirement Notification and \$158,000 PEIA Reserve. No reductions were incurred by counties.
- Looking back at FY2020, there were no major delays in regular state aid distributions, PEIA, TRS, nor any other funds due to county boards of education.



COVID-19 Assistance

- \$1.25 billion in federal funds made available to the Governor.
- \$287 million current year and \$400 million in FY2021 to the unemployment insurance fund.
- \$200 million to local governments.
- \$150 million small businesses.
- \$100 million \$50 million COVID 19-Related highway projects
- Charging COVID 19-related state expenses to federal funds.



COVID-19 Assistance

- Additional Federal Funds +\$86 million CARES Act.
- \$77.9 million CARES Act funds are encumbered for counties.
- Another \$8.6 million CARES plus more from WVDE going to, or on behalf of, counties.
- Otherwise, WVDE's federal funds from the USDE and USDA make up about 10% of federal funds comparatively statewide.
- (65% are for DHHR); Others are Transportation, Defense, EPA, etc.



New Budgeted Appropriations SB150 FY2021

- Safe Schools (cameras). A late FY19 supplement \$3.5 million plus \$400,000 in FY21.
- Attendance Bonus Incentive \$2 million in FY2020 and requesting an FY21 supplemental.
- Communities in Schools \$400,000 was new in FY19 followed by a \$3 million supplemental. \$400,000 in FY20. \$4.9 million in FY21.
- Low Income AP \$120,000 introduced in FY20. Continues.
- Career Exploration \$80,000 for FY21.



New Budgeted Appropriations

- Non-Traditional Child Hunger Solutions \$2 million for FY21.
- LEA Projects \$750,000 for FY21.
- Mountain State Digital Literacy \$415,500 for FY21.
- Jobs and Hope \$6 million in FY20. \$3.1 million for FY21.



Increased/New Budgeted Appropriations

- Step 7a Instructional Programs adds 10% growth in local share \$51m.
- Step 7b Technology adds 20% growth in local share \$26 million.
- Step 7d Teacher & Leader Induction adds 20% growth in local share \$5 million (previously teacher and principal mentors totaling \$619,000.
- SBA Debt Service is now for School Construction Fund \$24 million.



Increased/New Budgeted Appropriations

- From Ed & Arts in FY19
 - Benedum PD \$429,775
 - Governor's Honors Academy \$1,059,270
 - Special Olympic Games \$25,000
 - Imagination Library \$350,000



Looking Back – Looking Forward

- The year-end reductions did not affect funds to county boards of education.
- All state aid payments, PEIA, TRS and other payments were sent timely in FY2020.
- April 15, 2020 tax returns were deferred to July 15, 2020 which should boost FY2021 revenues.



Looking Back – Looking Forward

- HB 206 gave additional funds to counties, example <1,400
- Local share from 90% to 85%.
- Step 5 increases.
- 6a changed from 70.25% to 71.25%.
- Increased flexibility.
- Local share outpacing state revenues. Doddridge & Tyler.
- WVDE will submit its FY2022 budget proposal on September 1. Let us know of potential improvements to request.
